## Optional accessories

### Precision Adjusting Aid Torqui

The Torqui torque wrench allows you to adjust the cutter head perfectly and easily for the Bonum and all Aesculap Econom clipping plates.

- the ultimate tool for optimum clipping blade pressure
- consistent edge-retention
- increase in the cutter head's service life since the interval between grindings is extended

1. position the pins in the holes provided on the adjusting screw
  2. turn clockwise "Click Click" until the Torqui is idling
- = you have now set the ideal plate position

## Horse Clipping

### Why and when should a horse be clipped?

- clipping is recommended depending on the husbandry conditions and how much work the horse does
- the horse overheats less when riding and is therefore more willing to perform
- the horse dries faster after riding and is thus protected from colds
- the shorter coat is easier to keep clean
- the horse does not sweat when it stands in the warm stable

### Horse clipping is recommended when:

- the horse is ridden regularly - at least 3 times a week and is wet with sweat after riding
- your horse's coat takes longer than 20 minutes to dry
- the horse is already sweating in the stable (winter coat is denser and therefore too warm)
- the horse gets a long, thick winter coat, cannot be properly cleaned and dried very slowly

### You can read on the following pages which types of clipping there are and which type is used when.

Please make sure you cover your horse with an appropriate blanket to keep it warm, regardless of which clipping type you choose.

## Tips for clipping horses

### BEFORE CLIPPING

- Set aside around 2 hours
- Your horse should be relaxed. recommended after pasture time and the evening meal
- the horse should be clean, brushed and dry since dirt and sand can cause the cutter blades to become blunt more quickly
- If your clipper has a cable, this must be secured! (ideally hang it from above so that the horse does not accidentally stand on it)
- in order to get your horse used to the machine and the noise, touch the horse slowly at first and hold the machine in the direction of the horse's ears while it is running

### DURING CLIPPING

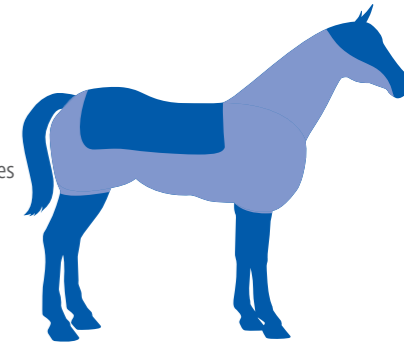
- always clip in even strokes against the direction of growth of the coat
- the shear strokes should overlap by at least 2 centimetres so that no edges are left standing
- change the angle of the clipper for heavy sections or use the more manageable Durati for harder-to-reach areas
- brush the loose coat from the horse
- oil the cutter blades generously every 10 minutes

## Clipping Pattern

### Blanket Clipping

For moderately active horses who overnight in the stable.

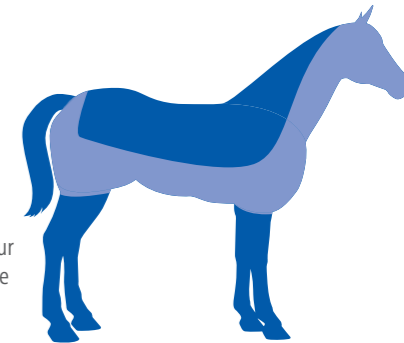
- mark out the shape of the blanket with chalk on the horse
- the lowest saddle line specifies how far down the blanket clipping extends
- always round off the corners when clipping



### Trace Clipping

For horses that in some cases work more, overnight in the stable and who are lightly covered in the pasture during the day.

- The difference to blanket clipping: the neck muscles remain covered with winter fur
- mark out the area in the same way as with blanket clipping and continue the line on the neck up to the ears



### Hunter Clipping

This clipping type was developed for hunting horses. It is suitable for all horses that perform medium to heavy work.

- the legs and saddle area are not clipped
- put the saddle on and mark out the outline with chalk
- mark each line on the legs. use your hands to measure a standardised height
